## IT IS NOT JUST ABOUT APPS



During the year, I often get contacted about whether specific Apps are safe. The advice I give is that no App which is marketed towards adults is safe to use by children. However, the problem is educating adults and children about the fact that they need to be cautious about downloading and using Apps.

Whilst some online safety organisations provide regular information about Apps and settings, the most important way to address online safeguarding issues is about changing behaviour. Fundamentally, this starts at home and parents need to look at the way that they address their parenting skills

When I deliver my online safety sessions to parents, I always start with looking at the basic ways that we protect our children e.g. teaching them to cross the road. In order for parents to look at a more holistic approach, rather than just dealing with alerts about apps, here are some useful tips for schools to share:

**New Devices** - Before you give a new device to you child, set it up to restrict what they can do with it. Many devices now have parental controls built in. If it is second hand, then restore it to factory settings.

**App/Game Check** - You can set up devices so that when a child wants to download a new App, they have to enter a passcode (which only the parent knows). Parents can then search for more info about the App.

**Filtering** - Whilst filtering is not 100% effective, it can offer further piece of mind to parents wanting to limit what their children can access.

**Digital Time** - Parents spend time reading with their children and it is advised that they sit down with them and find out more about Apps and on line safety together. Schools could issue tasks to promote this.

**Talk** - The most important action any parent can take is to talk to their child about using technology and don't let it become a 'digital dummy'

## SOCIAL MEDIA ADDICTION

A recent book by a silicon valley worker (Jaron Lanier) explained how social media works. He used the concept of behaviour modification which relates to the idea that you can train someone by rewarding them after they complete an action. It works with animals, by giving them a food treat, if they complete a trick.

If you think about that in relation to technology, Lanier explains that people can easily become addicted to social media and games as the instant rewards through ‘likes’ or shiny coin rewards gives people that instant ‘buzz’. This is the neurological process in the brain that is related to pleasure and the response of getting rewards.

His argument is that ‘likes’, ‘Instagram influencers’ and ‘retweets’ have now become the new reward that has become so addictive and with this, people lose touch with the real world and real people.

As you can see from the quote, the real question relates to children. If the social media sites and tech companies can get children addicted from an early age, then this will mean that the young people of today will become the customers of tomorrow.

When we look at the media trends of children and young people, we see a generation who love using technology. Whilst there may be nothing wrong with this, it will be interesting what future OFCOM reports will show and whether Lanier’s predictions are correct and that the concept of social validation is a plan to get people hooked.
